CTE's Role in the Age of Al

I recently attended an insightful event hosted by the North Dakota University System at Bismarck State College, focusing on emerging workforce needs. The central question was: What do business and industry leaders need from higher education to build a workforce equipped with the energy and AI knowledge demanded by the future?

The event brought together a diverse group of stakeholders, including industry leaders, college and university presidents, and experts in internet connectivity and power supply. A key takeaway was the urgent need to prepare for a future shaped by AI, and the rapid pace at which AI continues to evolve. Post-secondary leaders shared their institutions' plans for integrating AI across various disciplines, not just in computer science departments.

These discussions prompted me to consider: Is Career and Technical Education (CTE) doing enough to address the challenges and opportunities presented by AI? A quote from Ahyoung An, Senior Director of Product Management at MuleSoft, resonates deeply: "Every team in your organization is looking to the IT team to help them deliver AI-powered experiences. And I know we don't want to admit it, but IT doesn't have all the answers. Because AI isn't as easy as just turning it on. Delivering great AI experiences requires time, expertise and data."

The data is readily available and expanding exponentially. North Dakota boasts amazing CTE educators who are shaping the next generation of experts across numerous pathways. However, are we providing these educators and students with the time and resources to explore the potential of AI and discover its applications within their respective fields?

We must embrace the future, not fear it. AI will not replace human workers, but it will undoubtedly transform our work. I urge CTE educators in North Dakota to think creatively and explore how AI can enhance their classrooms, empower their students, and prepare them for the demands of the future workforce.

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Where does Family and Consumer Sciences Education Fit within the Modernization of the Career Clusters?

Recently, supervisors and assistant supervisors at NDCTE got together to begin mapping how each program area will transition from the initial Career Clusters to the newly modernized Career Clusters released last October. Since the newly modernized Career Clusters were released last fall, people have been asking "where does Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) fit within the clusters"? Family and Consumer Sciences content is wide and varied. We are not a one size fits all. This means that Advance CTE's recent modernization of the National Career Clusters® Framework has significant implications for Family and Consumer Sciences Education. Historically, FCS has been integral to Career Technical Education (CTE), offering programs that equip students with essential life skills and prepare them for diverse career paths. The updated Framework, released in October 2024, comprises 14 Career Clusters and 72 Sub-Clusters, serving as the primary organizing structures for CTE programs. In this modernized Framework, FCS is embedded across multiple Career Clusters, contributing to various state and local programs of study. This integration underscores the interdisciplinary nature of FCS, highlighting its relevance in preparing students for a range of careers.

Coming together from a variety of national FCSE organizations, Family and Consumer Sciences professionals across the United States have already been working hard at the national level to provide information to state level CTE agencies to elevate FCS Education within the new Career Clusters. What does that mean? What does this look like? While we are at the beginning of this process this is what it looks like thus far:

- 1. Align FCS Programs with Relevant Career Clusters: Identify and map existing FCS courses to the appropriate Career Clusters and Sub-Clusters, ensuring that curricula reflect current industry standards and workforce demands.
- 2. **Utilize Available Resources:** Leverage resources provided by Advance CTE, such as the Career Clusters Guidebook and crosswalk documents, to understand the intersections between FCS and the modernized Framework.
- 3. Advocate for FCS Recognition: Engage with professional organizations like the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (AAFCS) to promote the establishment of FCS as a distinct Career Cluster, emphasizing its critical role in addressing skilled worker gaps across various industries.

Collaborate with Stakeholders: Work with industry partners, postsecondary institutions, and community organizations to create pathways that provide students with real-world experiences, certifications, and opportunities aligned with FCS-related careers.

By strategically integrating FCS Education within the updated Career Clusters Framework, educators can enhance the visibility and impact of FCS programs, better preparing students for success in both their personal and professional lives. North Dakota FCSE teachers are encouraged to attend the annual ND CTE Professional Development Conference in August in Bismarck to learn more about the modernized Career Clusters and how to use them to build stronger FCS programs in their schools. Career Ready Practices

In 2024, AdvanceCTE published work that groups of educators, business leaders, and professionals had done to redevelop the Career Cluster Pathways. With this new edition came a new version of the Career Ready Practices (CRP). The Career Ready Practices, built on a meta-analysis of over 30 different listings of general professional skills, represent the skills needed to succeed in the modern workplace. It is believed that these practices should be embedded across the pre-kindergarten to workforce continuum.

Although the format of having 12 Practices was kept, all Practices changed numbers, were edited/split/added to, and had new key words attached to each. Since North Dakota developed rubrics in 2014 for teachers/professional to use as assessment based on these Practices, it was decided to change the ND model with the times and align with the national effort. Note that the new key words have been used for the "short form" of each competency, with each Practice now having only 5 competencies under it.

The old set of CRP rubrics will be used for the remainder of the current school year but will be discontinued after 2024-25; however, going forward, any new program area state standards approved by the state board will have the new set of 12 CRP also attached to them.

Remember the current set of rubrics used CRP numbers 1,2,4,8, and 12 for Work-based Learning (WBL) activities. This new set of CRP rubrics will be fully implemented starting in the 2025-26 school year and use the new CRP numbers 1,2,3,4,7, and 12 (with all competencies under each) as minimum for all Work-based Learning (WBL), but we encourage you to use all 12 CRP for best practice.

Starting the school year of 2026-2027, all 12 CRP with all competencies will be assessed for Work-based Learning, with no alterations or omissions by schools.

Thr 2025 PDC will be used to introduce and explain the system in general, which is similar to the old system, through the featured session workshops.

The 2026 PDC should be more focused on the new CRP and the rubrics, with program areas devoting time to ideas on how to implement them fully in the classroom.



Help Your Students Stay Connected with Compass

Your students can use Compass on their phones this summer to stay focused on their futures and keep in touch with employers. Just a few minutes each month is enough to keep their student profile updated, browse a few opportunities, and message an employer or two.





1. Download the Compass app.

The Compass mobile app makes it easy to keep up with the latest opportunities and stay in touch with employers. <u>Save these instructions</u> for downloading the app and synching their accounts.

2. Keep an eye on careers and work-based learning.

With more than 500 employers in Compass, there are always new opportunities. Ask your students to look at a few work-based learning experiences and Career Profiles that match their skills.

3. Find activities that interest them.

Encourage students to sign up for activities and events this summer that interest them and even explore some of the careers they are looking into. There are numerous programs across Minnesota and North Dakota, including the NDSU Summer Ag Academy, Herdina Construction Trades Camp at M State, North Dakota Leadership Seminar at the University of Jamestown, the Culinary Intensive Camp at NDSCS, DECA events, and more. Some of these programs are operated by or hosted by businesses that also use Compass, providing another opportunity to connect to potential employers. Be sure to check "Opportunities" > "Events" in Compass to see what is available.

4. Allow us to connect them with employers.

One of the best ways for students to find a career is for Golden Path to directly match them with possible employers. This process first requires student or guardian consent. Ask interested students to toggle "yes" for "Connect Me with Employers" in Compass if they are interested. We will reach out to them for a short phone conversation about their interests and goals.

5. Check back in monthly.

By spending a few minutes each month in the Compass app, students can discover opportunities, stay in touch with employers, and keep their student profile updated.

America's Field Trip is a nationwide student contest sponsored by America250, the official nonpartisan entity charged by Congress with planning the nation's Semiquincentennial in 2026, also known as the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. America's Field Trip invites students in grades 3–12 to be part of this historic milestone by sharing their perspectives on what America means to them — with the chance to earn a once-in-a-lifetime field trip experience at an iconic American landmark or cultural site, including the Smithsonian's National Zoo, National Archives Museum, Kennedy Space Center, and Yellowstone National Park — just to name a few.

- Submission Deadline: April 16, 2025 at 5:00 p.m. ET
- **Eligibility:** Any student in grades 3–12 who is a legal resident of any of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, or the U.S. territories is eligible to enter. First- and second-prize awardees from the America's Field Trip pilot contest, which ended on May 17, 2024, are not eligible to enter or win.
- **Requirements:** Students at each grade level may create artwork, including physical artwork, that is submitted through a high-res photo, digital drawing, or an essay.
- Judging Criteria: A panel of current and former educators will evaluate submissions based on Clarity of Idea (25%), Student Voice (50%), and Presentation (25%).
- Prizes: 25 first-place awardees from each grade level category and their designated chaperone will
 receive travel and lodging accommodations for a three-day, two-night trip to a select historical or
 cultural site. 25 second-place awardees from each grade level category will each receive a \$500
 cash award. Award recipients will be announced in May 2025, and field trips will take place in July
 and August 2025.

How to Enter the America's Field Trip Contest

Students at each grade level will respond to the prompt, "What does America mean to you?" with artwork or an essay. Students must develop submissions individually.

Students must have a teacher, parent, or legal guardian submit their entry through the application portal at <u>America250.org/FieldTrip/Application</u>. A teacher may only submit an entry on behalf of a student with written permission from that student's parent or legal guardian.

State Director's Column

69th Legislative Assembly

The 69th Legislative Assembly is nearing the final stages. Committee work will be wrapping up within the next few weeks and the Session has entered the Conference Committee period. If there is a difference in a bill between what is passed in House and Senate, and the first chamber does not concur with the amendments, a Conference Committee is named to iron out the differences.

The Department of Career and Technical Education is currently tracking 148 bills, which most we are simply watching. There are many that we are working in Committee and meeting rooms, for the benefit of Career and Technical Education and the students it serves. Below is the list of Legislative Bills we are spending most of our time on. I am not including any bills that have failed in either chamber, therefore are no longer under consideration.

HB1098 – A bill that would allow students pursuing the General Education Educator Pathway coursework to be eligible for the State Scholarship. This passed the House and has moved over to the Senate, where it has been assigned to the Senate Workforce Development Committee. A hearing was held on March 6th, but to date, not action has been taken.

HB1188 – A bill that would provide Area Career and Technology Center Boards more flexibility in assessing fees to member schools. This bill has passed both Chambers and has been signed by the Governor. It will become law effective August 1, 2025.

HB1498 – A bill that would permit school boards to provide a signing bonus for new teachers. This has been amended to also allow Area Career and Technical Center boards to provide signing bonus. This has passed the House and moved over to the Senate, assigned to the Workforce Development Committee. A hearing was held on March 20th, but not further action has been taken.

SB2019 – This is the Department of Career and Technical Education budget bill. This has passed the Senate as amended below. The amounts below are increases to the Department's current budget.

- Accept the \$4M Cost to Continue request
- Include \$3M for New and Expanding. The initial request was \$22M
- Accept the \$2.5M in Perkins spending authority
- Include \$100,000 for Market Place for Kids. The initial request was \$150,000
- Include \$750,000 for TrainND. The initial request was \$1.6M
- Include \$1,000,000 for Virtual Reality Career Exploration. The initial request was \$2,000,000
- Increases not included are as follows:
 - STEM Network \$250,000
 - CTE Educator Recruitment \$650,000
 - Apprenticeship FTEs \$600,000
 - WBL Coordinator Grants \$1.5M
 - Capital Projects \$56M

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State Director's Column

69th Legislative Assembly

This bill has been assigned to House Appropriations, Education and Environmental Division. To date, there has been two hearings, but no further action has been taken.

SB2234 – This bill would fund the Choice Ready Grants through the Department of Public Instruction. This has passed the Senate and has been moved over to the house, where it has been assigned to House Education. House Education passed

the bill with an amendment that decreased the appropriation from \$2M to \$1M. It has been rereferred to House Appropriations.

SB2239 – A bill that would create an apprenticeship grant program, that would offset expenses a new apprentice may have. This bill passed the Senate and has been moved over to the House, where it has been assigned to House Industry, Business, and Labor. A hearing was held on March 18th, but no further action has been taken.

SB2274 – A bill that will transition the Farm Management Education program from NDCTE to the Department of Agriculture. This has passed the Senate and moved over the House. House Agriculture has passed the bill, as did House Appropriations. It will now go to the House floor for final consideration.

Below are a few important days to be aware of for the remainder of the session: April 4^{th} – Deadline for rereferrals of bills in second house to Appropriations Committees April 16^{th} – Bills and resolutions must be reported out of committee in second house May 9^{th} – 80_{th} Day

As a CTE advocate, and a citizen of North Dakota, you can be involved in the process. The Legislative process is transparent, and thanks to technology, can be accessed anywhere. The following link allows citizens to watch House of Representatives and Senate Floor Sessions and Committee Hearings; contact their local Legislators; search and track specific bills and submit written and verbal testimony. A North Dakota login ID will need to be created to track bills and submit testimony. A login is not necessary to watch video of Floor Sessions or Committee Hearings.
