Private Career Schools in North Dakota

You may have not been aware that the ND Department of CTE has and continues to authorize all private career schools in the state so that they can legally operate. These schools are defined as private, vocational, technical, home study, business, professional, or other private schools or colleges offering educational credentials primarily to persons who have completed or terminated their secondary education or who are beyond the age of compulsory high school attendance, for attainment of educational, professional, or vocational objectives at a level no higher than the associate of applied science level. Some state professional boards have their own jurisdiction over their own professional schools of this type (such as in nursing, cosmetology, etc.), but many certificate-offering, post-secondary schools work with NDCTE to become authorized.

Through a yearly process of submitting documents to the agency, these schools operate in the state and offer professional certificates for hours of completion toward such jobs as massage therapy, welding, medical transcription, etc. The aim of this statute of state law is to provide validity to these schools (in addition to them working toward gaining national accreditation) and primarily to protect the citizens and potential students of North Dakota from predatory or "shady" businesses, which could provide a meaningless certificate or take money and provide nothing (i.e. fraudulent degree-factories). Most schools on the authorized list are in-state; however, out-of-state schools can and should apply.





Technology and Engineering Education instructors from across the state gathered in Valley City from June 20th to June 22nd for a summer professional development retreat. The three-day event provided the opportunity to learn new things and to share best practices.

On Tuesday, staff from UND shared information about aviation curriculum and Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS/Drones). Each instructor, learned a little about how to incorporate aviation and drone curriculum into their classes, practiced their drone flying skills, and went home with several books and a racing drone.

On Wednesday, the instructors got a demonstration of the Lulzbot 3D printers that are manufactured in Fargo, had a tour of the John Deer plant, and another tour of Valley City High Schools Technology and Engineering Ed department.





On Thursday they toured Freedom Machine Group. Both industry tours highlighted manufacturing automation and the diverse job opportunities that exist in North Dakota. Discussions on the STEL standards, favorite projects, equipment, and software were had in between tours. We are looking forward to this being an annual event.

Assistant Director's Corner

CTE Program Quality Vision Visits

One of the roles of the State Department is to provide technical assistance for program improvement, as we evaluate the programs across the state to ensure that approved CTE programs continue to provide high-quality instruction and opportunities for learners. All programs are evaluated, at a minimum, every five years as part of a team vision visit or individually by the state staff.

A program Vision Visit consists of:

Overview of program standards/self-review with instructor 15-minute exit review with instructor, administration and program supervisor that contains:

<u>Commendations</u> – Strengths of the program

<u>Recommendations</u> – Opportunities that can improve the program

<u>Violations</u> – Requirements to fulfill the intent of the law/policy

Within 20 days, the school/institution will receive a report from the Department of CTE. If a violation was noted on the Plan of Action, the school/institution completes the form within 30 days explaining how the violation will be corrected. A follow-up visit will be completed to validate that the corrections were made.

The state agency goal is that all programs are in a continuous improvement process to offer a quality program based on current standards.
