# **Update on ASVAB Requirement for North Dakota Scholarship**

<u>HB 1305</u> has been passed by the legislature and signed by the governor! This bill lowers the ASVAB score needed to meet the requirements of the Military Ready Pathway for the new <u>North Dakota Scholarship</u> from 85 to 50. In addition, <u>HB 1305</u> also makes the following <u>adjustments</u> to the new <u>North Dakota Scholarship</u> requirements.

The timelines and effective dates for the new North Dakota Scholarship are as follows:

- The classes of 2023 and 2024 may use either the old (Academic/CTE) or new North Dakota Scholarship requirements.
- HB 1305 doesn't take effect until August 1, thus any senior this year (Class of 2023) choosing to use the new requirements must use the ASVAB score of 85, and the new indicators would not apply. This year's juniors (Class of 2024) could use the new scholarship requirements with the ASVAB of 50 and the new indicators.
- Starting with the class of 2025 (current sophomores), students can ONLY use the new North Dakota Scholarship requirements.

We will update the scholarship chart and website over the summer to reflect the updated North Dakota Scholarship requirements that will take effect as a result of HB 1305. Three Collegiate DECA members from the University of Mary placed 2nd at the International competition in the area of Entrepreneurship: starting your own business.




# Market Day Held at SRCTC in Oakes

## **Seventh Graders Attend Careers on Wheels in Fargo**

More than 800 Fargo Public School students attended the annual Careers on Wheels (COW) event on May 5, 2023. COW is an annual event for Fargo Public Schools' 7<sup>th</sup> grade students, but this year, it took on a whole new look with a new location, more exhibitors, and hands-on experiences. What made this different? South High School graciously volunteered their parking lot to host an all-day event, instead of three individual events at Fargo middle schools, saving employers time, travel, and expanding the experience.

Students from Discovery and Ben Franklin were bussed to South High School (SHS), while Carl Ben Eielson middle schoolers walked to SHS. Students engaged in conversation with 34 business partners, spanning 10 career clusters ranging from Hospitality & Tourism to Manufacturing. Industry experts pro-

# Summer Opportunity Offers Teachers the Chance to Sharpen Their Classroom Baking Skills and Integration of Science into the Classroom

North Dakota Family & Consumer Sciences teachers will gather at Legacy High School in Bismarck June 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> for an FCSE intensive workshop that will update them specifically in the area of integrating science into the FCSE classroom through baking experiences. The workshop is being conducted by the Home Baking Association Baking STEAM team and will include Sharon Davis, FCS Education/Program Director with HBA members- North Dakota Mill, North Dakota Wheat, Northern Crops Institute and The Sugar Association with American Crystal Sugar.

Learning about ingredients and their individual importance to successful baking "every time" is at the heart of this workshop and will include teaching techniques on baking ingredient functions including flour is NOT just flour, naturally sweet, yeast is NOT a beast, and believe it or not, "heat is an ingredient". Value-Added Baking will be the discussion of ingredient substitution trends, nutrition, and flavors will also be part of the content of the in-service.

This workshop offers hours of back-to-back hands on activities for teachers to take back to their classrooms to ensure that students learn baking skills based on scientific studies and practices. A few of the baking experiences will include artisan and refrigerator dough shaping and baking as well as integrating nutritious options into quick breads. The hands on activities are offered with the thought of considering our local FCSE teachers as our local "test kitchen bakers", a teaching strategy with career connections.

Outside speakers from stakeholder businesses is another important component of this workshop. Neil Doty, Business Development Manager, Northern Crops Institute (NCI) of Fargo will share information on *Ancient Grains: Facts, Foods and Futures*. He will also share career opportunities in grain sciences. Teachers will also be able to sample ancient grain products.

Erica Olson, ND Wheat Commission, will be on hand as a guest baker addressing the concept of "farm to oven" and related career opportunities. The participants will also travel to a nearby wheat farm for an activity based field trip. Harrison Weber, Executive Director of Red River Valley Sugarbeet Growers Association will also be on hand to lend knowledge about the sugar industry and career opportunities. In addition, participants will hear from Vance Taylor, President of North Dakota Mill. He will talk about the history and impact the mill has for North Dakota along with careers in milling.

The workshop concludes with a graduation ceremony and participants taking home a "bundle" of baking resources for their classrooms.

### **Assistant Director's Corner**

#### **National Funding Issues and Update**

In my return from a national conference, I consider it an honor to represent our state, as I not only learn and get appropriate updates but I initiate and expand the relationships with those that are serving on the national level. It is always great to learn about new and exciting things going on across our country, such as things as a small Independent School District in San Antonio "only" having 10,000 students. Also, it is great to reinforce that we are not only keeping up with CTE issues but leading in a lot of related CTE issues. Recently, I attended the National Association for Career Technical Education Information (NACTEI) Perkins Leadership conference. This is a conference where we learned about national issues and best practices and procedures for those involved in the Perkins V grant. Below are some highlight points shared that are happening on the national legislative scene in Washington, DC.

#### FY 2024 Appropriations:

#### President's budget released

- 1. ACTE requested \$400 million increase
- 2. Administration provided \$43 million increase
- 3. Additional \$200 million funding for competitive grants

#### House proposes cuts to education funding

- 1. Retuning to 2022 levels
- 2. Limit to 1% growth

#### **Key CTE Authorization Issues:**

#### **Higher Education Act reauthorization/regulations**

- 1. most work currently focused on financial aid provision
- 2. Short term PELL grants a possible area of bipartisan support

#### **Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act reauthorization**

- 1. House passed partisan bill, no senate action
- 2. Key issue is infrastructure funding, youth provisions, and eligibility/data reporting for eligible training providers

#### **National Apprenticeship Act reauthorization**

- 1. Issues over industry recognized apprenticeships
- 2. Key CTE priorities: focusing on youth and pre-apprenticeship programs and expanding to non-traditional sectors and populations

#### **Educator recruitment and retention issues**

- 1. Raise and Retain Act -provides tax relief for teachers
- 2. Loan forgiveness for educators
- 3. Social security Fairness Act of 2023
- 4. Reform HEA title II
