CTE Around the State

Students in Williston High School's construction and trades class worked on a special project: building an actual house instead of typical homework. "It's hands-on (work) and you get to work with other people," said Peyton Summers, a junior at Williston High school. With their teacher and licensed contractor, Marc Davis, they are tasked with doing everything from assembling the deck all the way to the trim work inside the house. Everything is then inspected and made sure it is up to code. The house is just the latest project



that students in this class are building. For 15 years, Davis and his students have built houses, shops, and shacks, giving them insight into what it's like to have a career in construction. "It's easier being in high school, but it's still nice knowing that these guys are going into that (field)," said Davis. The students said it gives them a path forward when they graduate from high school.

Works of art! Students in the Family and Consumer Sciences classes at Rolla High School have been developing the skills needed to make a quilt go beyond sewing. A well-crafted quilt requires planning, measuring, mathematical accuracy, attention to detail, and more. Nicely done, Rolla High School students.! The Cooperative Work Experience or WBL experience in Jamestown meets the needs of students and the community. The experiences are tailored to their career interests that are offered for school credit. It allows a student an opportunity to work hand in hand, often side by side with experts in the field, said Darby Heinert, assistant director for James Valley Career and Technology Center and assistant principal at Jamestown High School. Greg Moore (pictured) can be found working in the body shop or parts department at R.M. Stoudt after school; he attends JVCTC in Jamestown. The experience is open to junior and senior students in Jamestown.

Students enrolled in the Central Regional Area Career and Technical and Technical Center participated in a hands-on learning experience in April. Do you know what to do in an emergency medical situation? These students from Flasher Public School , Wilton Public School, Washburn Public School, Underwood Public School, Dakota Adventist Academy, Kidder County Schools, and New Salem-Almont Public Schools returned to their schools and communities CPR certified by the end of today. Students learned, practiced, and demonstrated life saving practices including CPR and proper use of an AED in both adult and child/infants.

The Bismarck Manufacturing Facility is the primary location for Bobcat excavators, small articulated loaders, mini track loaders, and aftermarket parts.

The Bismarck Career Academy welding program has partnered with Bobcat and provides them with employees who are skilled in welding. According to Dale Hoerauf, CTE Director, "Our goal at the Bismarck Public School Career Academy/Tech

Center has always been to let students explore career choices. If they find a career that they like we want to then take them to the next level in their career path. That could be post secondary dual credit/articulation or straight to industry."

TWO GOALS OF THE PARTNERSHIP

Instructor Luke Mellmer spoke with Dean Kuhn at Bobcat and quickly realized how the skills being taught in welding at the BCA coincide with the welding skills needed at Bobcat. There were two specific goals of the partnership: (1) to provide students with an opportunity to get first-hand experience at a welding facility before they commit to a welding job, and (2) to provide a business in our community reliable, technically skilled employees.

Students who take welding for three years are enrolled in the Welding Capstone Course which allows for the instructor to work closely with students to assist with setting up a work-based learning experience. Three students that graduated in

May 2021 are currently employed at Bobcat. Three students that are currently planning to graduate in May and have already been hired by Bobcat. There are specific skills required by Bobcat for the work-based learning experience include being well versed in the Gas Metal Arc Welding Process and a hands-on welding test.


THE PERSPECTIVE OF SENIOR BRENDEN BUCHHOLTZ

Students learn in the classroom, then apply those skills in the lab at the Bismarck Career Academy. According to Brenden Buchholtz, a senior at Legacy High School who has been working with Bobcat for almost a year and currently in the Capstone Program, said, "I like how you go through the learning process of welding from the ground up, you start with the easier things and work your way through the difficult welds, then test with a weld/bend test. I love working at Bobcat because you are in an enclosed building and do not need to worry about the weather. It's a great work environment." Brenden's career goal is to become a TIG welder and Pipe Welder, then Master Welder.

Planning for the 2023 Legislative Session

As we continue to plan for the 2023 Legislative Session, there are many groups that have Career and Technical Education and workforce needs as their priorities. One specific entity is the North Dakota Workforce Development Council. The role the North Dakota Workforce Development Council is to advise the Governor and the public concerning the and extent of workforce nature development in the context of North



Dakota's economic development needs. The Council is appointed by the Governor and is required to consist of over 50% private industry representatives. These industry representatives are scattered across the entire state, representing multiple industries.

The Council has drafted several priorities to address the workforce needs of the state and categorized them into four broad categories. Each of these categories have been assigned to a sub-committee of the Council.

The sub-committee that has a focus on Career and Technical Education is the Career Exploration and Skill Gap Subcommittee. Their top priorities are:

New and Expanding CTE Centers – Support the current initiative

Career Exploration – Increased focus on North Dakota's schools

Apprenticeship, Internships and Job Shadows – Expanding access to all students

The Council is now in the process of selecting key priorities and determine initiatives and potential Legislative requests, that will assist the state in meeting workforce demands. Between now and early June, each of the subcommittees are being tasked to do this work and report to the full Council. At that time, the council will publish their final priorities list for the 2023 Legislative Session. I will be able to share more at that time.
