The "Make Your Mark" Scholarship supports the SkillsUSA Career Model and aims to expand the talent pipeline for future skilled trades leaders, while improving economic outcomes for students. This year's scholarships are for the Fall 2025 academic term, with individual awards of up to \$5,000 based on verified educational costs.

#### Who is Eligible?

- High school seniors or current/enrolling postsecondary students with expected direct educational costs for Fall 2025.

Recipients must also submit a Scholarship Acceptance Form, official documentation of costs, and a thank-you message to Aerotek.

#### Insights from the RUReady.ND.gov Survey

In early 2025, NDCTE surveyed schools across North Dakota to learn how <u>RUReady.ND.gov</u> and its integrated tools—Compass, Career-ViewXR, and Methodize—are being used. Nearly 60 schools responded, representing a mix of small rural districts and large multibuilding districts. The feedback highlighted what's working well and offered thoughtful suggestions for how the platform can continue evolving to support meaningful career development for students.

#### Who's Using RUReady.ND.gov —and How

Survey responses show that delivering RUReady.ND.gov is a team effort. Career Development Counselors, CTE teachers, Career Advisors, Work-Based Learning Coordinators, and Special Education teachers were the professionals most commonly involved. Most students engage with RUReady.ND.gov on a monthly basis. While some schools use it more often, time constraints in others limit use to just a few lessons per year.

#### What's Working Well

Respondents highlighted several features that are widely used and valued. Career Assessments—such as the Interest Profiler, Work Values Sorter, and Basic Skills Survey—remain the most frequently used tools. Resources like the Career Plan Builder and Compass Career Profiles also ranked high. The RUReady.ND.gov Plan of Study and Compass Profile are both frequently used to build Four-Year Plans.

Schools reported success using CareerViewXR for immersive career exploration, whether through VR headsets or web-based video tours. There's also a growing use of Methodize ACT Test Prep as a support for ACT readiness.

#### Where We Can Improve

There were comments related to the need for a more modern, intuitive user interface. We're pleased to share that XAP is actively working on updates to streamline the navigation and improve the student experience in RUReady.ND.gov.

A barrier mentioned by respondents was a lack of dedicated time during the school day to use RUReady.ND.gov. While we can't create more hours in the day, our goal is to make every interaction with RUReady.ND.gov as efficient and impactful as possible so that more educators feel confident incorporating it into their work with students.

Many respondents expressed a strong interest in making the single sign-on process easier. North Dakota's upcoming transition to Infinite Campus may help streamline access—and that remains the goal.

#### **Training: What Professionals Want**

There's strong interest in in-person training, with many valuing the chance to connect face-to-face. At the same time, the flexibility of hybrid and virtual options is appreciated. Looking ahead to the 2025–26 school year, professionals can expect a variety of formats—including in-person workshops, live virtual sessions, and short recorded videos focused on specific features. This will include customized support for tools like Methodize, based on feedback requesting clearer guidance and more targeted resources.

#### What's Next?

This survey gave us more than feedback—it gave us a roadmap. Professionals across the state are using RUReady.ND.gov to make a difference in students' lives, and they're eager to do more. We're listening. Based on your input, we're exploring platform updates, new training models, and improved integrations to support your work.

#### **ND Collegiate DECA ICDC Recognition**

Forty-seven ND Collegiate DECA members competed at the International Career Development Conference in San Francisco, CA, alongside 1,300 other participants. North Dakota came home with a national champion title, a second-place finish, and five other events in the top 10. In addition, three more events made it to the finals, and four others were recognized for their exceptional exam performances. Before the conference, North Dakota also secured a first and second place in the online competitions.

ND Collegiate DECA has active chapters at Bismarck State College, Lake Region State College in Devils Lake, Mayville State University, Minot State University, North Dakota State College of Science in Wahpeton and Fargo, University of Mary, University of North Dakota, and Valley City State University.

Bismarck State College was a new chapter this year, thanks to former high school competitors Greyson Connelly (Beulah) and Cammie Veldcamp (Jamestown), who played a key role in organizing the chapter and were our state's top performers at the national level.













#### **69th Legislative Assembly**

By the time you are reading this, the 69<sup>th</sup> Legislative Session should be complete. This will be the agency's final Legislative update for 2025.

The Department of Career and Technical Education tracked 149 bills, with topics ranging from property tax relief, various agency budget bills, and school choice. The following are the bills that survived the session, that the agency worked on directly or watched closely and have an impact on Career and Technical Education.

**HB1098** – A bill that would allow students pursuing the General Education Educator Pathway coursework to be eligible for the State Scholarship.

**HB1188** – A bill that would provide Area Career and Technology Center Boards more flexibility in assessing fees to member schools. A CTE Center Board must now assess a membership fee to its members and then may assess a fee based on student enrollment.

**HB1498** – A bill that would permit school and area career and technology center boards to provide a signing bonus for new teachers.

**SB2019** – This is the Department of Career and Technical Education budget bill. The amounts below are increases to the Department's current budget.

\$4M was added to address Cost to Continue expenses.

\$3M was added for New and Expanding CTE programs.

\$500,000 was added for the Work-Based Learning Coordinator Grant.

\$2.5M was added for Perkins spending authority. This is only authority to spend additional dollars if the State's Perkins allocation is increased.

\$100,000 increase for Market Place for Kids.

\$750,000 increase for TrainND.

\$1,000,000 was provided to continue and expand access to Virtual Reality Career Exploration.

Finally, \$300,000 in funding was provided to the Department for moving expenses. It was decided during the Legislative Session that the 15<sup>th</sup> floor is to be used by Legislative Council and NDCTE will be leaving the Capital. In the coming months, the Department will secure a new location and move its operations. We will ensure we keep you updated as we make progress in the move.

**SB2274** – A bill that will transition the Farm Management Education program from NDCTE to the Department of Agriculture.

I would like to thank everyone for all the work done locally during the Legislative process. Thank you for all you do for the students of North Dakota!
